SUCSESSES

- 2018: Collaborating with diverse stakeholders, Andy helped craft and negotiate the advancement of legislation that created the Rural Broadband Task Force, which is responsible for developing plans for deploying broadband in rural areas of the state. The bill passed 48-0. Andy's efforts on the broadband legislation was part of a larger portfolio of telecommunications work, which has made him one of the top telecommunications lawyers in the state.
- 2017: In the wake of a scathing audit of the Nebraska Tourism Commission, Andy worked with Sen. John Stinner to craft legislation to restructure the Commission. The legislation passed 48-0 and will ensure more diversity in the Commission and better oversight of its work and finances.
- 2016: Andy successfully led efforts to kill legislation that would have allowed cities to take over control of local libraries, threatening privacy protections and First Amendment rights.
